

diy rose chintz caddy box

Extra Supplies needed:

- 120 Grit Sandpaper
- Water Mister
- Wax to seal your project
- Scissors

Rose Chintz Caddy

1. Give your caddy, a really good sand with 120 grit sandpaper.
2. Dampen your sponge brush and paint the inside of your caddy. Let dry.
3. If you're wanting more Cathedral Taupe showing more than white, paint your entire caddy and let dry.
4. Working in sections start with the front apply another coat of Cathedral Taupe. Do not let the paint dry.
5. Carefully align your Rose Chintz Inlay on the wet paint. Rub over with your finger tips and keep the inlay taught.
6. Using your scissors carefully cut the inlay to size.
7. Spray with your water mister and use the damp chux cloth to go over the inlay. Let it dry for about 10 minutes.
8. Repeat steps 4 to 7 for the back of the caddy.
9. Once dry carefully remove the transfer paper from the caddy. If you find that the transfer paper is not peeling away easily lightly wet with your water mister.
10. Don't throw away the pieces of Inlay. You can use them up to 4 times on your projects. The design will become lighter and lighter with each use.
11. Apply more Cathedral Taupe to the sides and repeat steps 4 to 9.
12. Once completely dry, distress to your liking.
13. Seal all your hard work in with either a wax or a water based polyurethane. Either of the Fusion Tough Coats or Dixie Belle Clear Coats will work a treat.
